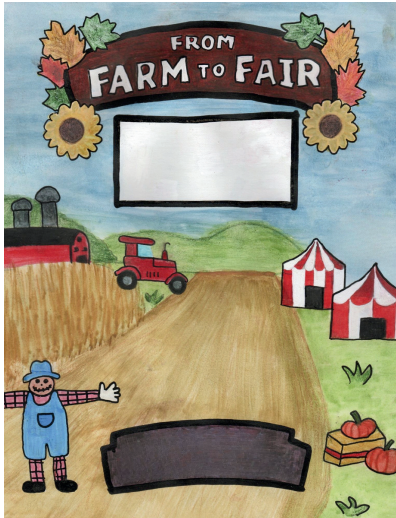
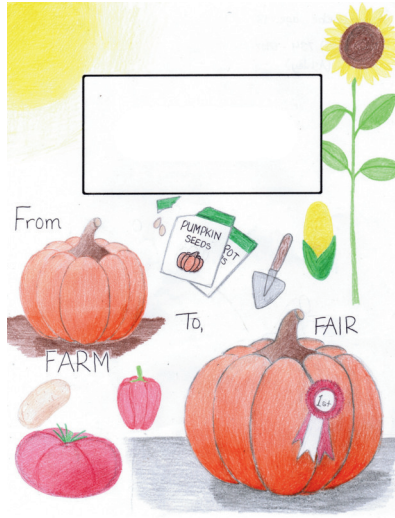

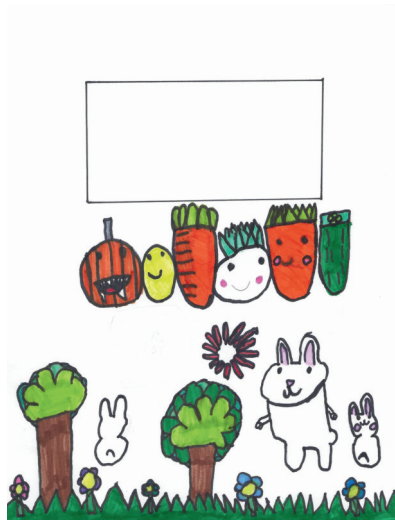

Rules and Regulations

General Rules for Everyone

- **No Smoking or vaping** of any kind is allowed in the arena, buildings or on the grounds.
- **Alcohol** may be purchased and consumed only in **designated areas**
- **Recreational drugs** are not allowed anywhere on the grounds or in buildings.
- The Wainfleet Agricultural Society reserves the right to **inspect bags, coolers, and backpacks** upon entry.
- **Only service animals** are permitted on the grounds and in buildings.
- All attendees, exhibitors, volunteers, vendors, entertainers and other persons attending the Wainfleet Agricultural Society Fall Fair must **treat others with respect**
 - Anyone who does not comply may be asked to leave.
 - Security or law enforcement may be contacted if necessary.
- **Vendors** must carry a Vendors pass upon entering the fairgrounds to avoid paying admission.
- **Volunteers** must be registered and wear a lanyard with their name
 - Student Volunteers must sign in and out to register their volunteer hours,
 - Are requested to return their lanyard.
- Children (under the age of 12) must be always supervised by a parent or guardian.
- **Weapons, fireworks, laser pointers, and any hazardous or disruptive items** are prohibited on the fairgrounds.
- The Wainfleet Agricultural Society reserves the right to close exhibits, restrict access, or evacuate the grounds due to weather, safety concerns, **and/or** emergency situations.

Liability

- Exhibits, animals, and displays are entered **at the exhibitor's own risk.**
 - No unauthorized handling or feeding of animals is permitted without the exhibitor's permission
- **All animals** brought onto the fairgrounds must be healthy and fit for exhibition.
 - The Society reserves the right to remove any animal showing signs of illness, injury, or distress.
- Upon entry to the fairgrounds, you might be photographed or recorded for promotional and marketing purposes by the Wainfleet Agricultural Society.
- The Society is **not responsible** for loss, damage, injury, or accidents during the fair.
- All exhibitors and participants must follow biosecurity and handwashing guidelines
- **Only authorized vehicles are permitted on the grounds.**
 - **Bicycles, scooters (not required for mobility purposes), skateboards, and e-bikes** are not permitted in pedestrian areas during fair hours.
- The Wainfleet Agricultural Society reserves the right to refuse admission or remove any person who does not comply with these rules and regulations without refund.

Penny Sale

- Prize items can be collected from the Penny Sale area **Sat., Sept. 19, 2026 from 5:00 to 9:00pm.**
- Winners **MUST** bring their yellow, **Penny Sale Ticket Stub.**
- Final pick up at off-site location by **Tue., Sept. 22, 2026 by 7:00pm (by appointment only)**
- Unclaimed prizes will be **donated to local charities** by **Class Chair.**

Exhibitor Rules and Regulations

- All exhibitor classes and competitions are open to residents of **Niagara Region and Dunnville.**
- Exhibits must be delivered to the arena on Wed., Sept. 16, 2026, between 2:00pm and 9:00pm.
 - No entries will be accepted after 9:00pm
 - All animals must arrive by the time specified for their class.

Rules and Regulations

- Only one entry per Exhibitor Number in any section of any class (for example CC103), **except if noted in the rules for that specific class.**
- Exhibit space is limited. Excess non-winning entries may be returned or not displayed.
- Exhibitors who misrepresent ownership or do not follow rules will forfeit prizes and ribbons.
- All exhibits must be made, grown or owned by the exhibitor, unless otherwise specified.
- Needlework, crafts, and hobby items must be clean and original to this fair.

Exhibitor Numbers & Tags

- A **current Exhibitor Number** is required to be eligible for prize money or ribbons.
- Fees: (see changes in Exhibitor Numbers Names)
 - Adult /Students Grade 9 to12: **\$5.00**
 - JK to Grade 8: **\$2.00**
 - JK to Grade 8 may enter an Adult /Students Grade 9,12 section (unless the section specifically indicates a Grade) by paying an additional **\$3.00**
- Students enter grade sections based on their **grade as of September of the current year.**
- Exhibitor information (name, town/city, phone, email) must be **fully completed** in the database.
- **Exhibitor Number Cards** must be shown to collect prize money.
- Availability of Exhibitor Numbers:
 - At the **Wainfleet Farmers Market** on Tuesdays in Aug. until Sept. 8, 2026
 - **At the Wainfleet Arena Wed., Sept. 16, 2026, from 2:00-9:00pm.**
 - **Online registration will be permitted, however, failure to pay fees will disqualify the exhibitor from receiving prizes or ribbons.**
- Exhibitor Numbers **do not provide free admission** to the fair.

Selling Exhibits

- Items for sale must be clearly marked **“For Sale”** on the White Exhibitor Tag.
- Buyer information will be collected and passed on to the exhibitor.

Exhibit Pickup

- Exhibits to be picked up **Sat., Sept. 19, 2026, from after Closing Ceremonies to 9:00 pm. After 9 items will be left in the lobby with no Security. Any other variations will be posted in the Class specific Rules and Regulations.**
- There is very limited space available, items will be left in the arena lobby for pick up on **Sunday, September 20 from 9:00 am to 1:00 pm.** Note: there is no Security in the lobby Sunday morning. Any remaining items will be donated (if appropriate).
- Items deemed unsafe for consumption will be disposed of.

Liability

- Exhibits, animals, and displays are entered **at the exhibitor's own risk.**
- All animals are subject to a **health inspection at the time of arrival**, and sick or debilitated animals will be removed from the fairgrounds.
- All exhibited animals must be properly secured and shall not be allowed to run at large within the fairgrounds, Failure to comply will result in the animal and its' handlers being asked to leave, forfeiting any entry fee(s).

Judging & Awards

- Judging takes place **Thu., Sept. 17, 2026, until 3:00pm** in the Arena and Pavilion.

Rules and Regulations

- **No unauthorized persons** are allowed in judging areas during judging.
- Judges decide whether **an exhibit is worthy of a prize**. No prize money will be awarded to **non-compliant entries**
- **Judges' decisions are final.**
- **Point System:**
 - 1st place, 3 points
 - 2nd place, 2 points
 - 3rd place, 1 point
 - 4th place, ½ point

District Competition

- Eligible non-perishable winning exhibits selected for District Competition will be held and transported by the Society.
- Perishable or high-value items will be returned to exhibitors prior to the District 6 AGM in November.

Protests & Corrections

- Any protest must be:
 - Submitted **in writing**.
 - Clearly explain the concern
 - Signed by the complainant
 - Delivered to the Secretary **within one week**
- The decision of the Directors is **final**.
- The prize list may be corrected for **typographical errors or omissions**.

Prize Money Payouts

- Prize money can be collected on **Sat. Sept. 19, 2026, from 3:00 to 9:00 pm.**
- Winners must bring their **Exhibitor Number Card**.
- Some prizes may be distributed by the **Class Chair**.
- Unclaimed prizes may be picked on **October 8th, 5:00 to 7:00 p.m.**, at the Seniors (Friendship) Room of the Arena.
- Prize money not claimed after that date will be **donated to the Fair**.
- The Adult/Grade 9 to 12 exhibitor with the **highest total points** will receive **\$50.00**.
- The JK to Grade 8 exhibitor with the **highest total points** will receive **\$25.00**

- Food should be sealed in leak proof plastic e.g. ziplock bags
- All entries must be tagged with a proper tag, secured to each entry
- In categories where there are 6 entries or more, there will be a fourth prize

Specific Rules Preschool, JK to Grade 8 and Grade 9 to 12

- Students enter in your grade section only as of September of the Fair
- Exhibits must be made by Exhibitor

Adult Specific Rules

- No manufactured or prepared mixes or pie fillings unless specified
- No whipped cream is allowed. Whipped topping may be used.
- JK to Grade 8 may enter any adult class provided they have paid an extra \$3.
